Deacon John Dagerman and his crew, Rita Dolan and her raffle helpers, and Crystal Anderson and her basket-fillers. There should be a report on how things went in the coming weeks. For example, we might be complaining that our government isn't working. What is your voting record? What do you do to pressure our leaders to act uprightly?
